7	Report.
8	MR. LIMMER: Since the engineering report was
9	circulated and everybody has read it, I suggest
10	rather than basically reading it, as it's

12	questions to the report, really have to be gone
13	through since we are on this conference call
14	DIRECTOR WEINBERG: Steve, before we go to
15	section two, just for the sake of the
16	transcript, Michael, can you ask whether or not
17	there are any abstentions or any objections or
18	nay votes to any of the prior motions in Section One?
19	CHAIRPERSON KALNICK: Assume that questions
20	had been asked, I certainly didn't hear any, but
21	let's in turn: Were there any objections or nay
22	votes in items 1.1 through 1.9?
23	(No response.)

1	CHAIRPERSON KALNICK: Let the record snow
2	there were none.
3	DIRECTOR WEINBERG: Thank you, Michael.
4	CHAIRPERSON KALNICK: Steve Limmer.
5	MR. LIMMER: I was just saying on the
6	Engineering Status Report that if there is
7	nothing new to add unless there are any
8	questions since the report was circulated, I
9	don't think it's necessary to go to actually
10	have the report read as it is usually done at
11	the meetings.
12	DIRECTOR JOHNEAS: I have a question.
13	On Middle Neck Road, the water main as I
14	understand it, the final timeframe through
15	March, is there any plans to move forward with
16	that this summer?
17	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: Jay, at this time
18	we are proceeding with the design that is going
19	to take place this summer but obviously if we
20	are still in the middle of this COVID-19
21	situation we are not going to willfully put the
22	project ahead such as turning people's water off
23	for the construction. But we don't know what
24	later in the fall will bring or early fall may
25	bring.

1	We are just trying to Mike Rispoli has
2	been in contact with the county a number of
3	times to see where their paving schedule is at
4	and I don't believe Mike has heard back; is that
5	correct, Mike?
6	MR. RISPOLI: That's correct in terms of
7	Middle Neck Road. Other county projects that
8	were scheduled for 2020, this calendar year, I
9	was told are proceeding as planned. That was
10	from a week and a half ago. I have not received
11	any updates from them. But I am continuing to
12	follow-up with county officials regarding Middle
13	Neck Road paving.
14	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: So Jay, to answer
15	your question, we are going to try to proceed in
16	the best we can between hopefully COVID-19
17	ending in the near future, and if the county is
18	planning to proceed with paving, I believe they
19	are talking spring/summer of 2021 so that there
20	is a lot of time.
21	DIRECTOR LEVY: Greg?
22	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: Yes.
23	DIRECTOR LEVY: I had several questions from
24	residents with regard to the backflow testing.
25	Are we going to extend or are we going to do

1	anything about it? Because there are a lot of
2	people who are not comfortable with people
3	coming through the house to do testing.
4	Are we going to give it time, how are we
5	going to handle it?
6	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: All right. Great
7	question. I've been going back and forth with
8	Susan and I forgot the other lady's name from
9	the town
10	DIRECTOR LOPATKIN: Councilwoman Monica
11	Lurvey.
12	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: Yes, thank you,
13	Susan.
14	Back and forth e-mails last week on this
15	issue.
16	I brought the topic up three times a week on
17	a conference call with the Long Island Water
18	conference. Also on this call, New York State
19	Department of Health, Nassau County Department
20	of Health and Suffolk Department of Health.
21	This question that I have asked ad nauseam
22	and finally got an answer from the state and
23	local level which is they are not going to
24	change the sanitary code and they are not going
25	to say backflow devices do not have to be tested

1	this year.
2	So that being said, and I am asking for
3	something in writing and I had a subsequent
4	conversation with Bill Provoncha, Nassau County
5	Department of Health asking him to put in
6	writing, he said he is really looking for the
7	high risk devices, that they absolutely, no
8	matter what have to be tested. If the other
9	ones get pushed off a little bit, it's not as
10	critical. So I am looking for that in writing,
11	asked for that two weeks ago, still haven't
12	received that in writing. So as of now we could
13	have a state violation if we do not make sure
14	these tests are done.
15	So we are proceeding as of now, unless the
16	Board changes this, but from an operational
17	standpoint, we are proceeding notifying everyone
18	of when their tests are due and proceeding in
19	the normal fashion.
20	Most of our backflow devices I should say
21	all of our irrigation devices other than maybe a
22	handful that were grandfathered way back when,
23	all those backflows are in the pits. So there
24	is no reason why those backflow devices cannot
25	be tested.

1	There has also been an enormous amount of
2	construction that's taken place here in the last
3	20 years and I believe it's been ten years since
4	we have made it mandatory for every domestic
5	service to be put outside in a pit as well.
6	They have an accompanying backflow device put
7	outside also in the pit. So there is no reason
8	they cannot be tested.
9	So at this point unless the Board wants to
0	change it we are going to proceed to try to get
1	as many done as possible. I know we sent an
12	e-mail out last week, we have between 5,700 and
3	6,000 backflow devices, so the way we normally
4	have it set up is by cycle. We start notifying
5	very early in the year. I don't believe the
6	first residential shutoff would be until June.
7	Cycle 11 would be in May which is just fire
8	lines, so the first residential would not be
9	until June and we can make the determination,
20	the Board can make the determination as we get
21	closer to see where this COVID-19 is going.
22	If people do not feel comfortable having
23	backflow testers in their house, I guess that's
24	their call, we're going to do the best we can to
25	keep some semblance of control over this program

1	because we have so many, that's why we break it	
2	down by cycle, we break it up. We do not have	
3	the staff to handle all these tests at the same	
4	time, it's impossible to postpone everybody. We	
5	are trying to keep everyone on schedule.	
6	Hopefully this starts to free up and the tests	
7	can start to come in later in the summer.	
8	We also have to balance out, there is a lot	
9	of irrigation systems that go off come the fall;	
10	therefore we will, once they are off people are	
11	not going to give us tests, so that's the issue	
12	we are going to have with the Health Department.	
13	We are doing our due diligence now through our	
14	normal correspondence so if we don't hit 100%, I	
15	believe we won't get a violation so long as we	
16	show our due diligence to try to get them	
17	tested.	
18	That's a long-winded answer, Dan, that's the	
19	best I can give.	
20	DIRECTOR WEINBERG: Quick question, Greg:	
21	What's the difference is there a difference	
22	between a backflow test in the house versus on	
23	the property itself?	
24	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: Well the people	
25	don't have to worry about residents don't have	

1	to worry about a backflow tester coming back	
2	into their house. A backflow tester can just	
3	drive by and test the device out in the pit,	
4	leave, leave the paperwork in the mailbox for	
5	the resident to sign and the resident can either	
6	e-mail it back to the backflow tester or e-mail	
7	it, send it back. There is multiple ways this	
8	could be done, or even in the house you can	
9	really get it done. As long as most of the	
10	devices are in the basement. If there is a	
11	basement in the house, to let them in, basically	
12	stay six feet away, let them go down, come up,	
13	leave the paperwork, fill it out at a different	
14	time, send it back.	
15	So but if there are people who are	
16	absolutely opposed to it, again, our first	
17	shut-offs are not until June for residential.	
18	DIRECTOR FRANK: Greg, but this occurs at the	
19	same time as you're having your system turned on	
20	for irrigation and at the same time that you are	
21	having the devices tested, so right?	
22	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: Yes, it's a great	
23	point. If someone is having the irrigation	
24	system turned on, they should have the backflow	
25	tested at that point.	

1	DIRECTOR LOPATKIN: I think that's common.
2	That's what my people did. They came, they
3	left, they didn't find anything. It was
4	completely contact-less.
5	DIRECTOR CELENDER: Yeah. I had the same
6	thing just recently.
7	DIRECTOR LOPATKIN: I personally don't think
8	this is a major issue. I think maybe a handful
9	of people have got stuff in the basement and if
10	you have a flood, if you had an electrical
11	problem, you would let a trained person in to
12	fix it. I think it's in the same category.
13	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: Yes. Backflow
14	testers, Susan, asked the question a few weeks
15	ago; backflow testers, plumbers, irrigation
16	companies are all considered essential workers.
17	CHAIRPERSON KALNICK: All right. Should we
18	move on?
19	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: All right. So the
20	proposal from CDM Smith for Woodland Property
21	Development. If everyone remembers, this
22	project has been around for six, seven, eight
23	years.
24	I think this developer is finally getting to
25	a stage where he is going to need utilities.

1	Initially D&B had this contract but they	
2	extended it numerous times and at this point	
3	they don't want to continue so we asked for a	
4	proposal from CDM Smith. This would all be at	
5	the developer's cost. At the very last page of	
6	CDM's proposal you will see it not to exceed	
7	\$33,100.	
8	Looking for Board approval on that.	
9	DIRECTOR LEVY: I so move. ¹¹	
10	DIRECTOR LOPATKIN: I second it.	
11	CHAIRPERSON KALNICK: All in favor?	
12	(Whereupon all directors responded in the	
13	affirmative.)	
14	MR. LIMMER: For the court reporter, based	
15	upon Steve Weinberg's comment before, ask you	
16	all in favor, ask if anybody is opposed or is	
17	abstaining so we don't have to go back.	
18	CHAIRPERSON KALNICK: After 2.2, anybody	
19	opposed or abstaining?

1	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: Okay. The first
2	item I have up is a proposal from Pace Labs.
3	They are looking for an increase, they are
4	looking for a little bit bigger increase. We
5	have negotiated it down to three main items:
6	Highlighted are coliform, principle organics and
7	1-4, dioxane, the ones they are looking for
8	changes.
9	This comes to a potential increase of \$4,708.
10	Coliform bacteria is where we do roughly 511 a
11	year so it all depends on that. This could
12	change this price a little bit lower, little bit
13	higher depending on the number of samples we
14	take.
15	Pace has done wonderful work for us and I
16	recommend the Board renew with Pace at the
17	additional cost.
18	CHAIRPERSON KALNICK: Motion to accept? ¹²
19	DIRECTOR LEVY: I so move.
20	DIRECTOR WEINBERG: Second.

12	Electric was incomplete, no total bid cost or		
13	bid bond; Bancker Electric who had the previous		
14	contract the previous three years is loo	king for	
15	a \$2,000 increase from what we paid th	em the	
16	last three years which I think is reasonable		
17	considering the timeframe.		
18	So I would recommend we award to Bancker.		
19	CHAIRPERSON KALNICK: N	lotion to award?	
20	DIRECTOR LOPATKIN: At so	ome point that's a	
21	14% percent increase so over three years that's		
22	more than 5%. I am just saying, I mean i	t	
23	doesn't sound like a lot as a discreet amount of		
24	money but that's quite a percentage.		
25	What did we budget?		

1	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: A little bit over
2	5% a year.
3	DIRECTOR LOPATKIN: Yes, that's what I came
4	up with.
5	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: Yes. Budget that
6	we have allotted in our electrical budget so
7	this will be fine budget wise.
8	We used to use Wire to Water many years ago.
9	They we're talking 10-15 years ago, they used
10	to charge over \$20,000, so in today's dollars, I
11	think this is a reasonable number.
12	DIRECTOR LOPATKIN: We used to pay a lot more
13	is what you're saying.
14	SUPERINTENDENT GRAZIANO: Yes, Wire to Water.
15	We branched out, we put these out for bid.
16	Yes, you're right, it's a significant increase
17	percentage wise; but dollar wise, it's still,
18	\$14,000 is a lot less than we used to pay.
19	DIRECTOR LOPATKIN: Okay. That's fine. That
20	satisfies me.
21	CHAIRPERSON KALNICK: Motion to award? 13
22	DIRECTOR LEVY: I so move.
23	DIRECTOR LOPATKIN: I second.

9	the two of them they add up to about 35%. This
0	was added in after we knew what was going on and
1	after we knew we were receiving the grant.
12	But that purchase of the carbon vessels now
3	goes towards the total but is exclusive of both
4	those items which is actually a good thing for
5	us.
6	We need an emergency approval from the Board
7	so that the purchase of the UV treatment and
8	once that occurs and the UV treatment would most
9	likely fall under that category as well, would
20	come to 650,000. We believe it's going to come
21	in cheaper, somewhere in the \$575,000 range.
22	Since we are not done negotiating, I would
23	like approval of emergency purchase of the UV
24	treatment up to 650,000.

22	invoice come in, we sent it	over to the EFG	-,
23	they paid and then we paid	the contracto	r,
24	et cetera. No grant was pu	t to that until v	ve go
25	to final closing. That's whe	n they establis	h

1	the grant for 25%.	
2	This process is different since it's	
3	\$3 million strictly grant money. The way I	
4	understood it is they are going to pay out the	
5	grant first so whatever we keep submitting they	
6	will pay up to 3 million and after that we pay	
7	but that hasn't been established.
